Based on the "City of Nagoya Master Plan," which is the guiding principle for the management of the city, this plan shows our long-term vision for city planning and comprehensively and systematically outlines the measures to achieve it. The Nagoya City Master Plan 2028 (draft) imagines what our city will be like in 2040, taking into consideration the opening of the Chuo Shinkansen maglev line and the time when the population of elderly people will peak nationwide. The Master Plan includes a list of initiatives that need to be implemented over the five years from 2024 to 2028. This plan shall also serve as the city's local version of the Comprehensive Strategy based on the Act for the Creation of New Towns, People and Workplaces.

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

1	Demographic changes due to a falling birthrate and aging society	The population of The City of Nagoya had been increasing for 24 consecutive years, but began to decline in 2021. Although the population increased again in 2023, the city is expected to enter a phase of full-scale population decline in the near future.		
2	Demand for social inclusion	<ul> <li>The living and employment environment is changing with the decline in the functioning of local communities and the increase in the number of non-regular workers.</li> <li>Diversity is to be respected regardless of gender, age, disability, or nationality.</li> </ul>		
3	Raising the momentum for a sustainable society	<ul> <li>The concept of biodiversity is becoming more important, and the transition to a circular economy is required.</li> <li>There are concerns about the aging of both private buildings and public facilities as time passes.</li> </ul>


\* **Digital divide**: Information gap caused by the ability to use information technology such as computers and the internet, and by the lack of access to information technology.





 Designated manager systems: Systems in which a local public body comprehensively assigns a private company, designated as a manager, to maintain, manage, and operate public facilities.





#### Matters related to marriage (unmarried people and late marriages)


Among the major factors contributing to the falling birthrate, <u>more people being</u> <u>unmarried and late marriages have a</u> <u>particularly large impact.</u>

Many of the younger generation hope to marry someday, <u>they cannot find a suitable</u> <u>partner</u> or that <u>they do not have enough</u> <u>money</u>. The number of young people who say <u>they will never get married</u> is also on a slight increase.

#### Matters related to child-rearing (decline in birthrate for married people)

Both unmarried and married people want to have about two children on average, but the average ideal number of children and the average number of children planned by couples are declining due to such reasons as the expense of child-rearing and education, being unable to bear any further burden of child-rearing, and interference with one's job.







# Toward the Realization of Nagoya as a City of Diversity

Diversity is a prerequisite for the development of all key strategies. Diversity is an essential element as a municipality in building a society where no one is left behind. At the same time, it is an important factor as a large city for being chosen by many people and businesses and continuing to grow in the future.

In particular, the City of Nagoya is expected to take the opportunity of hosting the Asian Games and Asian Para Games to realize a society that recognizes diversity and allows everyone to live as they are, regardless of gender, age, disability, or nationality.

The city will promote initiatives from the following perspectives to become "Nagoya, a city of diversity," where diversity coexists and diversity leads to growth.

#### • A society that is inclusive of diversity, where no one is left behind (where people are secure to coexist)

The city aims to create a Nagoya where all people can live together in peace and security, where diversity in both soft and hard infrastructure is a prerequisite for all aspects of life, including living, visiting, studying, and working.





All results will then be compiled and utilized to enable more effective administration of the city in the future.
