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About the Nagoya City Master Plan

Based on the “City of Nagoya Master Plan,” which is the guiding principle for the management of the city, this plan shows our long-term vision for city planning and comprehensively and systematically outlines the measures to achieve it.

The Nagoya City Master Plan 2028 (draft) imagines what our city will be like in 2040, taking into consideration the opening of the Chuo Shinkansen maglev line and the time when the population of elderly people will peak nationwide.

The Master Plan includes a list of initiatives that need to be implemented over the five years from 2024 to 2028.

This plan shall also serve as the city’s local version of the Comprehensive Strategy based on the Act for the Creation of New Towns, People and Workplaces.

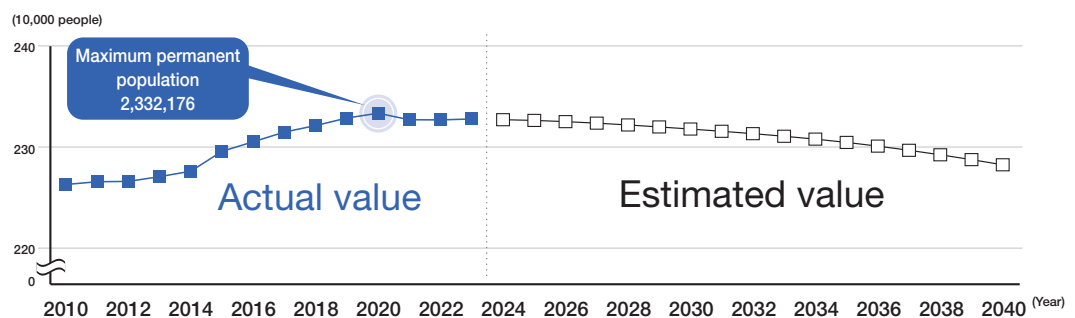
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Current Issues for the City of Nagoya

1	Demographic changes due to a falling birthrate and aging society	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▶ The population of The City of Nagoya had been increasing for 24 consecutive years, but began to decline in 2021. Although the population increased again in 2023, the city is expected to enter a phase of full-scale population decline in the near future.
2	Demand for social inclusion	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▶ The living and employment environment is changing with the decline in the functioning of local communities and the increase in the number of non-regular workers. ▶ Diversity is to be respected regardless of gender, age, disability, or nationality.
3	Raising the momentum for a sustainable society	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▶ The concept of biodiversity is becoming more important, and the transition to a circular economy is required. ▶ There are concerns about the aging of both private buildings and public facilities as time passes.
4	Diversification of values	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▶ There is a growing need for location-independent work styles and open spaces. ▶ People-centered, walkable, and attractive urban development is required.
5	Concerns about disasters and infectious diseases	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▶ The possibility of an earthquake is on the rise with a 70-80% probability of a massive earthquake occurring in the Nankai Trough in the next 30 years (about 90% within 40 years). ▶ Damage caused by record-breaking heavy rains has been occurring across the country. ▶ Increased preparedness for emerging and reemerging infectious diseases is needed.
6	Expansion of people interacting and the area of exchange	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▶ When the entire Chuo Shinkansen maglev line opens, a super mega-region with the world's largest population will be formed, and Nagoya will be its central city. ▶ With the hosting of the Asian Games, Asian Para Games, and other events, we expect to see an expansion of exchange.
7	Changes in the industrial sector	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▶ The industry must respond to changes in industrial structure due to accelerating digitization and decarbonization. ▶ The rapid growth of startups around the world is transforming not only industrial structures but also urban structures.
8	Rapid progress of digitization	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▶ While digital technology is rapidly developing and being utilized, issues such as the information gap (digital divide) and lack of digital human resources are becoming apparent.
9	Decarbonized society*	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▶ In response to the Paris Agreement of 2015, global warming countermeasures are being implemented around the world. ▶ In addition to renewable energy, hydrogen energy and other forms of energy are becoming increasingly important.

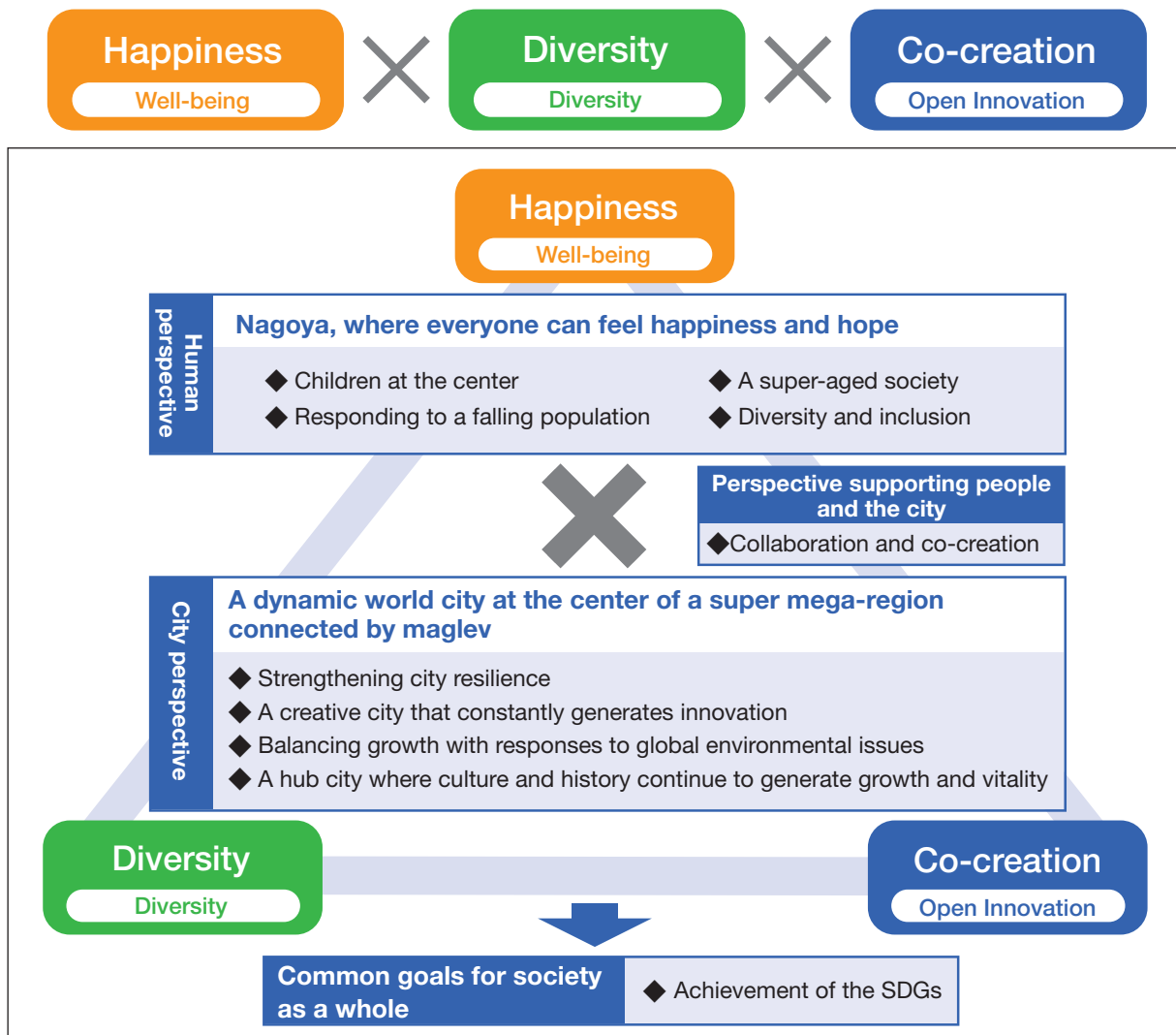
* **Digital divide:** Information gap caused by the ability to use information technology such as computers and the internet, and by the lack of access to information technology.

Decarbonized society: A society in which an equilibrium is maintained between the emissions of greenhouse gases generated by human activities and the absorption of greenhouse gases through the preservation and enhancement of greenhouse gas sinks.

About the SDGs

The SDGs are 17 goals common to the world that aim to realize a sustainable and better society where no one is left behind, as listed in the “2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development” adopted at the United Nations Summit in 2015.

In 2019, the City of Nagoya was selected by the national government as an SDGs Future City*, and all of society is working toward the realization of a sustainable and resilient city where the economy, society, and the environment are in harmony.



* **SDGs Future City:** The government selects cities that propose outstanding initiatives to achieve the SDGs. The City of Nagoya was selected in July 2019.(As of May 2023, 182 cities have been selected.)

2 Our Vision for the City of Nagoya

Based on the “Basic Policy,” the future vision for the City of Nagoya, which we pursue to achieve by 2040, is expressed in the following five elements.

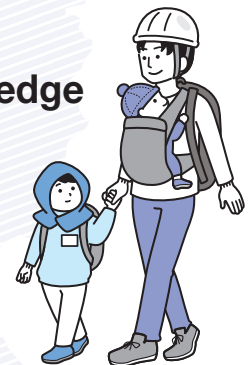
A city where families can raise children with confidence, and where children and young people can grow and develop into well-rounded adults

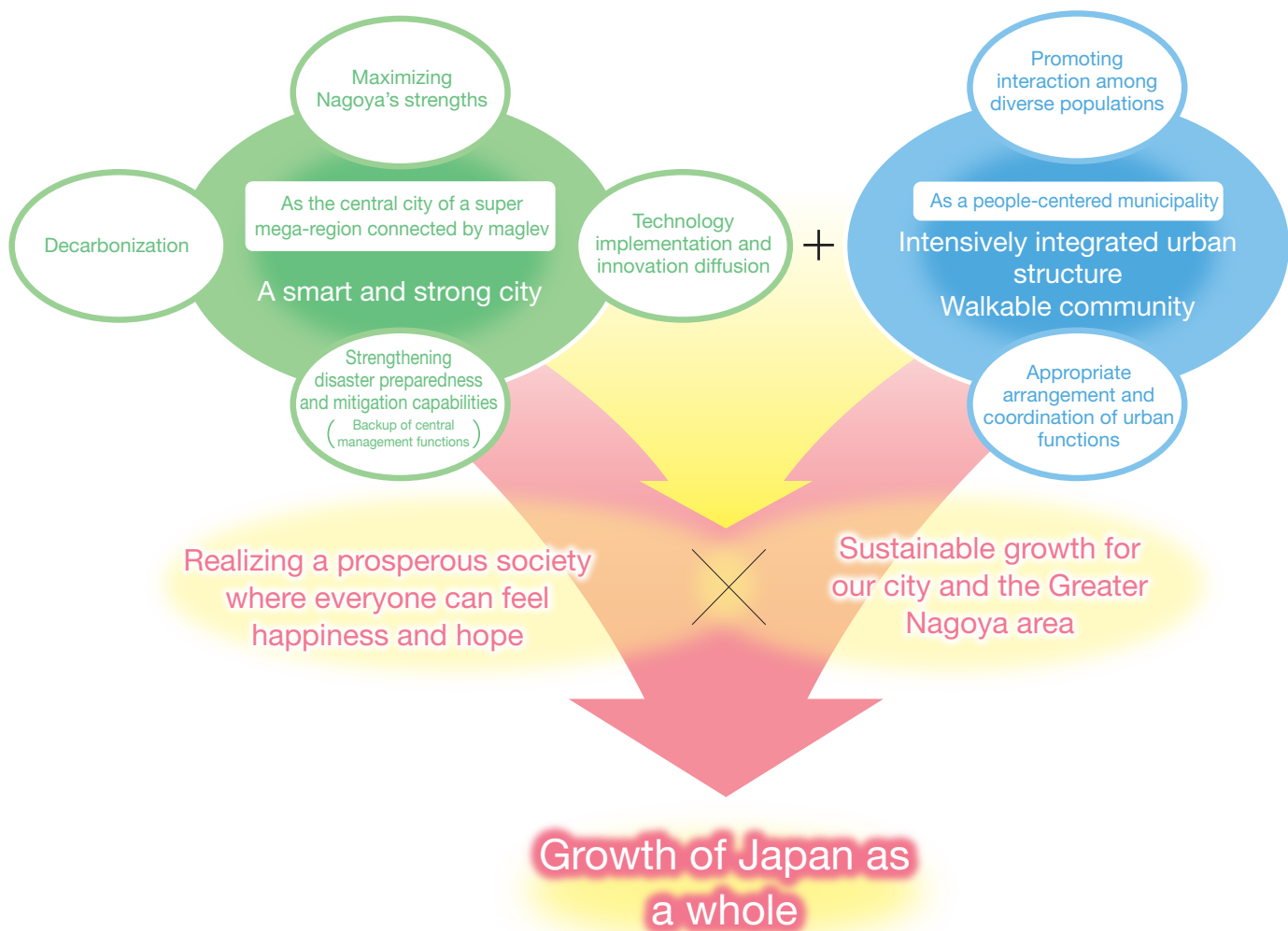

Initiatives to Achieve the Vision for Our City

1 Reforming the city government and strengthening its foundation

The city will display the direction of our efforts toward the realization of our vision for Nagoya based on our basic ideas on the management of the city government and the current trends and issues surrounding the administration.

- ▶ Striving to operate our administration with the principle of respecting human rights as its pillar, and promoting policies from the perspective of respecting diversity and valuing each and every person.

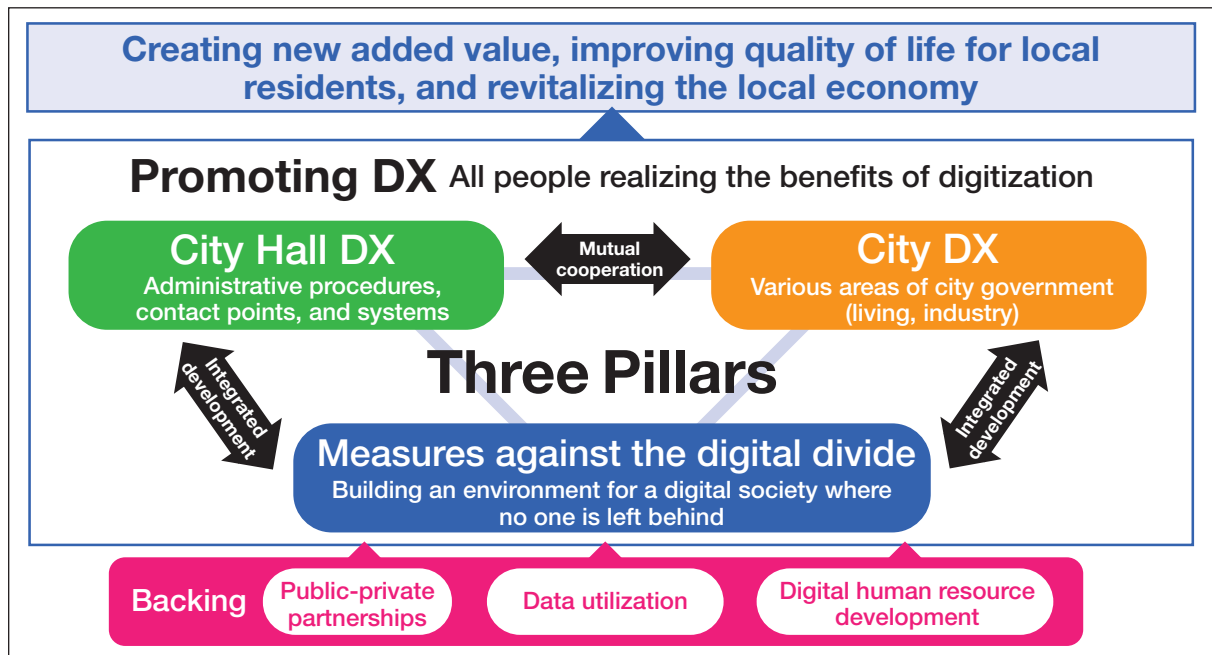

* **PPP/PFI:** PPP is a generic term for public-private partnership methods for the development and operation of public facilities, such as PFI, designated manager systems* and Park-PFI. PFI is a method of utilizing private-sector funds, management capabilities, and technical expertise in the development and operation of public facilities.

Designated manager systems: Systems in which a local public body comprehensively assigns a private company, designated as a manager, to maintain, manage, and operate public facilities.

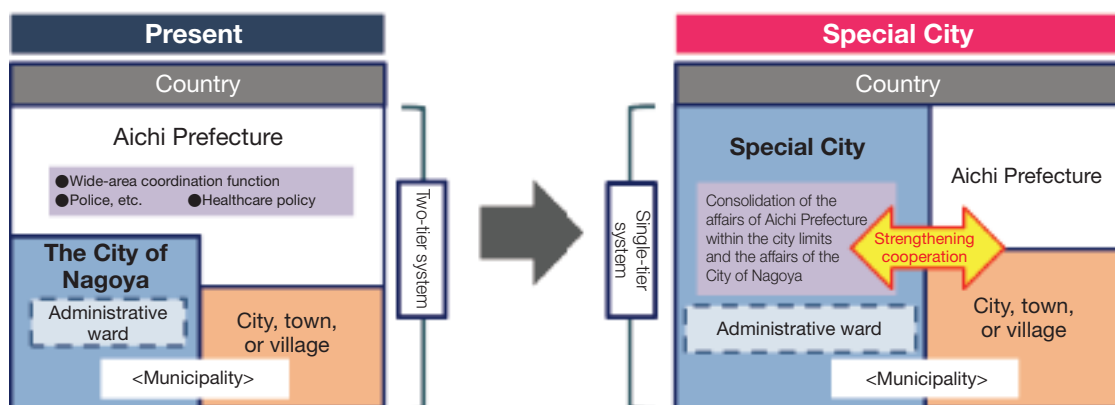

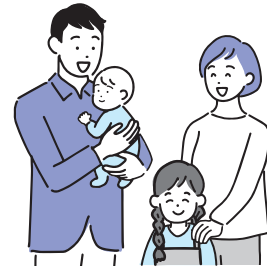

Matters related to marriage (unmarried people and late marriages)

Among the major factors contributing to the falling birthrate, **more people being unmarried and late marriages have a particularly large impact.**

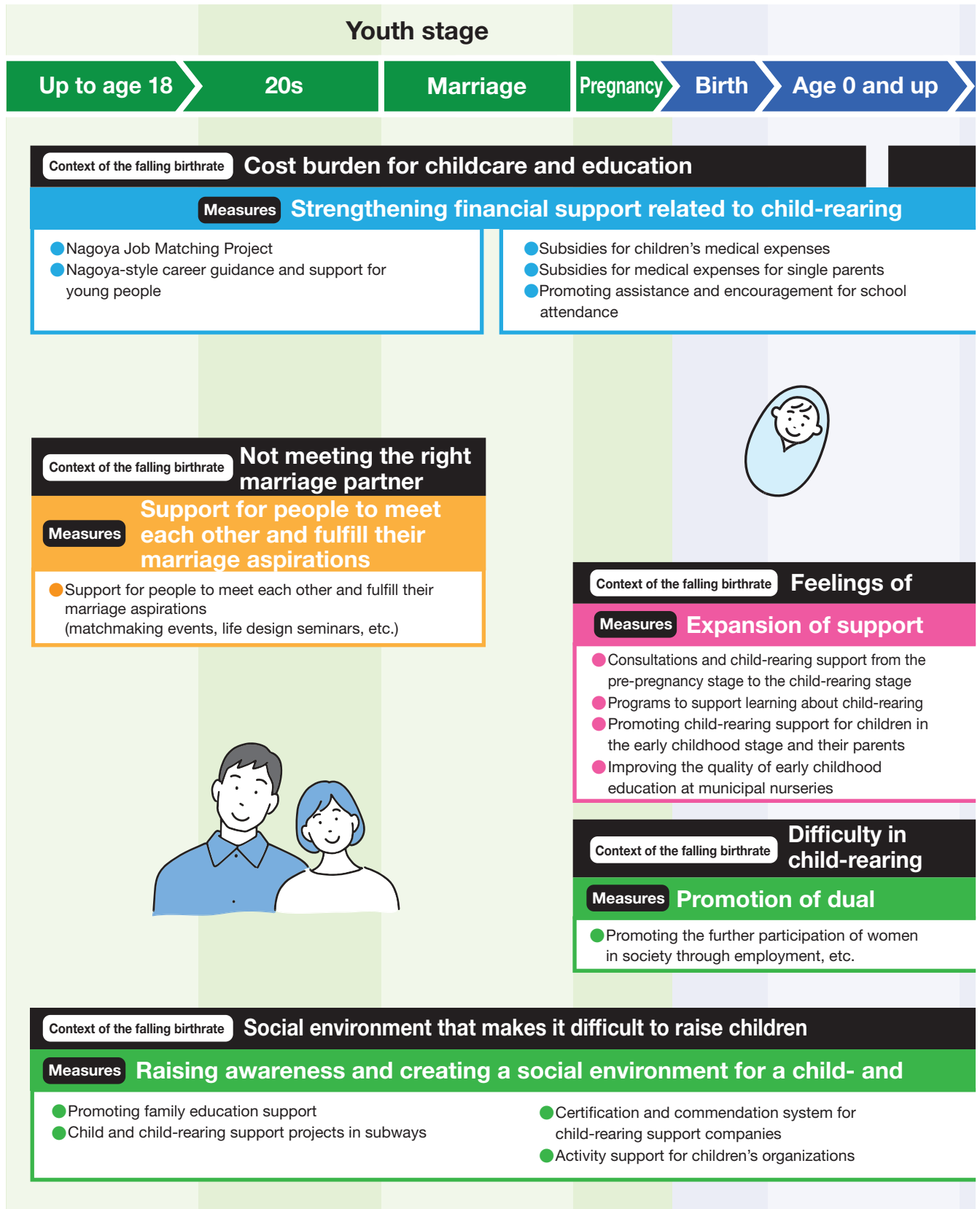
Many of the younger generation hope to marry someday, **they cannot find a suitable partner** or that **they do not have enough money**. The number of young people who say **they will never get married** is also on a slight increase.



Matters related to child-rearing (decline in birthrate for married people)

Both unmarried and married people want to have about two children on average, but the average ideal number of children and the average number of children planned by couples are declining due to such reasons as **the expense of child-rearing and education, being unable to bear any further burden of child-rearing, and interference with one's job.**

* **Inclusive educational system** : Article 24 of the UN Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities encourages respect for human diversity to enable disabled people to develop their mental and physical abilities to their fullest potential. The Convention also states that people with disabilities should be included in the general education system, thereby allowing them to participate effectively in a free society.

Young carers: Children/young people recognized as being overly involved in nursing care of a family member or other daily living activities.

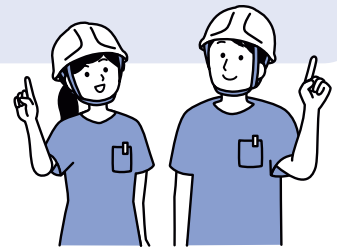

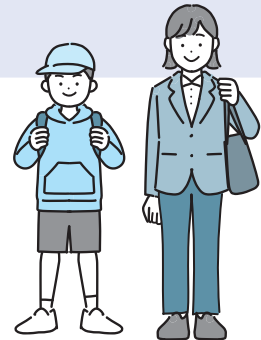

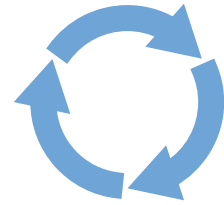

Toward the Realization of Nagoya as a City of Diversity

Diversity is a prerequisite for the development of all key strategies. Diversity is an essential element as a municipality in building a society where no one is left behind. At the same time, it is an important factor as a large city for being chosen by many people and businesses and continuing to grow in the future.

In particular, the City of Nagoya is expected to take the opportunity of hosting the Asian Games and Asian Para Games to realize a society that recognizes diversity and allows everyone to live as they are, regardless of gender, age, disability, or nationality.

(1) Project Progress Monitoring

Details for each of the projects included in this Master Plan will include their current statuses and targets to monitor progress. This information will then be released to the public each year. After the Master Plan has concluded, the City of Nagoya will evaluate and verify the targets of the actual outcomes of each of the projects in the Master Plan. All results will then be compiled and utilized to enable more effective administration of the city in the future.

(2) Priority Budget Allocation

Each financial year, the budget will be allocated to each major strategy in keeping with the progress made in each area to ensure that funds are allocated where they are needed most.

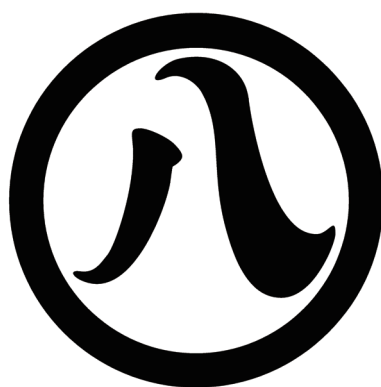
